He has been a volunteer on the selection committee and set up committee at the Kariton Gallery Abbotsford


Mike was a member Fraser Valley Wood Turners, for 6 years. His wood work has sold in Granville Island and surrounding wood galleries.


Many years later a class offered at the YWCA, using watercolours, ignited her spark to paint again. Alice adopted watercolours as her painting medium.


"Painting is a desire to make a visual statement in response to observations. Trials and errors occur during painting attempts that keep me challenged and motivated."
